SUNY ESF in the High School Field Trip to Newcomb

Imagine a quiet, warm Adirondack log cabin overlooking a snow-covered landscape. Imagine snowshoeing on top of three feet of snow across a frozen lake and up a mountain to look out over a sea of green trees. Imagine completing a service project which helps an environmental educator pick up a local area after a night hike, and involves pulling two of your slightly-injured friends in a sled over a snow covered forest trail. Then, at the end of the day, imagine heading into a well-lit cabin to play cards and dice games with a few of your favorite teachers. Last, imagine all of this being a part of your ESF class where you are learning about the environment, its impact, and your personal connection that began 170 miles away in Mr. Peter Wilder's classroom.

On Friday, February 28, our SUNY ESF class departed from the Fabius-Pompey High School with 12 students and 4 chaperones. Peter Wilder, Kevin Sharpe, Jean Gasparini, and Rose Langey graciously led our ESF class into the Adirondack Park for a weekend of adventure and discovery. Making a pit stop in Old Forge for lunch, we learned how to play pool at Tony Harper's Pizza before ending our day's voyage in Newcomb, New York, which is located in the Huntington Wildlife Forest. This research campus is a small part of a larger run area owned by SUNY ESF. Jake O'Connell, our ESF outdoorsman, guide, and educator, met us at Newcomb to lead us through the memorable and inspiring weekend. On Friday night the group focused its learning on watersheds by snowshoeing around Arbutus Lake, a lake that collects runoff water from surrounding hills and mountains.





On Saturday our class snowshoed the 4 mile round trip trail of Goodnow Mountain. At the furthest point we

climbed the stairs of a firetower and explored the observer cabin, both of which are located at the mountain's summit. At its peak the mountain has an elevation of 2,664 feet, which lends itself to amazing scenic views of Upstate New York's mountain ranges. Snow frosted trees, frozen lakes, and majestic mountains as far as the eye can see provided astonishing vistas. While at the top we enjoyed our packed lunches, we were able to save money by bringing all of our own food. During this, we

investigated the aged trinkets inside the old observer cabin. Making our way down the mountain, Mr. Sharpe provided us with small sleds that enabled us to experience the thrill of sledding down such a long mountain

trail. After we got to the bottom, we took a bus to the Adirondack Interpretive Center where we observed wildlife, read local maps, and learned about the surrounding area. After eating dinner back at camp, once again the meal we cooked and brought all ourselves, we headed out to complete our service project back at the Adirondack Interpretive Center. We were tasked with collecting candle-lights that were placed along one of the many trails and paths of the AIC. By gathering these candles, we returned the

trails back to their more natural state. Additionally,





because we performed this service project, the price

of the field trip was cut in half by SUNY ESF. Later that night we gathered back in Huntington Lodge for an outstanding night of tabletop games and bonding.

Finally, before we returned to Fabius on Sunday afternoon, we journeyed out across the frozen Arbutus Lake to an island. Along the way we drew pictures in the snow and learned about the function of sundials. Saddened to have to leave, we piled our sleeping bags, coolers, and backpacks back onto the bus. Our last treat was stopping at Stewart's on the way home to order various flavors of milkshakes. Overall, this experience was completely amazing and one that I'll never forget.

ANNUAL BUDGET VOTE AND BOARD OF EDUCATION MEMBER ELECTION

The Annual Budget Vote and Board of Education Member Election will be held on Tuesday, May 20, 2025, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 9 p.m., prevailing time, by voting machine at the Fabius-Pompey Middle School-High School in the Town of Fabius, New York (for residents of the Towns of Fabius and Cuyler) and the Pompey Community Church in the Town of Pompey, New York (for residents of the Towns of Pompey, LaFayette and Cazenovia).

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FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

As we work through the budget process for the 2025-2026 school year, like many school districts across New York State, F-P is facing a financial crossroad. Developing a school budget is a complex, months-long process. It requires balancing rising costs, unfunded state mandates, and limited funding flexibility with student needs. Behind every dollar are real decisions about programs, staffing, and opportunities. While our priority is always to support student success, this year's budget reflects difficult decisions driven by expiring federal aid, flat state funding, and inflationary pressures.

In recent years, with the help of associated Covid relief funds, we invested in programs that support student learning and well-being. Programs and services like Pre-K, expanded mental health services, added school safety measures and technology enhancements which included one-on-one devices, were made possible through this temporary funding.

With the expiration of associated Covid relief funds totaling approximately \$2.7 million, a recent financial settlement from a 1980 event lawsuit, and several years of flat or minimal increases in state aid, our district faces significant financial challenges. In order to balance the budget next year without corrective action, we would need to draw \$1.325 million from reserves. We would need to use even more reserves the following year, leaving the district without any savings. Three years from now, we could be facing insolvency. Just like managing a household budget, relying on savings to cover ongoing costs isn't sustainable.

To ensure long-term financial stability, budget reductions were necessary. While reviewing all expenses we prioritized protecting classroom instruction. However, with 75% of our budget tied to salaries and benefits, some staffing reductions were unavoidable. While we worked to minimize impact on teaching positions, a few teacher positions and teaching support staff positions were reduced. We also are not filling some non-instructional staff positions that are currently vacant or affected by retirement.

To minimize disruption to students, the administration reviewed staff scheduling to ensure efficient use of available teaching time. In some cases, teacher schedules have been adjusted to better align with student course needs. This helps to maintain and preserve access to important classes while reducing costs without compromising course availability or instructional quality.

There are some misconceptions circulating about administrative spending. Our district is not top-heavy or bloated. Administrative costs are comparable to similarly-sized districts, and our district office staffing has steadily declined. Years ago we had seven employees working in the district office. Next year after a planned retirement and a decision not to fill that position, we will operate with just four staff in the district office.

Administrative positions, like teaching positions, are essential in today's complex educational environment. With increasing state and federal mandates, compliance, and reporting requirements, adequate and strong administrative support is critical to keep operations running efficiently, ensuring resources stay focused on students and classrooms.

We understand that budget decisions affect people, programs, and the entire school community. Our goal is to make strategic and thoughtful choices that preserve the quality of our educational programs with minimal impact to staff while ensuring the district's long-term financial stability. With flat state aid and rising cost, spending must align with revenue. In recent years we have used a portion of our reserves and Smart Schools Bond funds to balance the budget and limit the tax burden. Relying on reserves to balance future budgets is no longer sustainable. To ensure the viability of our educational programs, in addition to the loss of several staff positions, we are asking the voters to approve a budget with a 4.9% tax levy increase. Since this is over F-P's maximum state tax levy limit of 3.6%, it would require a supermajority vote to approve the budget. A supermajority is 60% of the voters saying yes to our upcoming budget vote. It is important to know that our budget of approximately \$21 million is a modest decrease of about 1% from last year. Despite the challenges, we believe this budget preserves essential programs. It will continue to support our students' needs and advance our district goals, including curriculum enhancements at the elementary level along with continued development of STEAM and CTE in our high school.

We are committed to open communication and transparency. A Q&A section is now available on the district website to address common questions. A detailed budget newsletter will be mailed in early May, and we encourage you to attend the annual public budget hearing on May 6. Your input and support are essential as we work together and move forward to ensure a strong future for our students.

Elementary School

When the cornerstone for the building at 7800 Main Street was set in place in 1931, so too was the foundational belief that has guided the District in the years that have followed, "Enter to Learn, Leave to Serve."

This solid belief in learning, in order to prepare for productive citizenship, displays itself on a continuum from Pre-Kindergarten to Commencement. We aspire for academic excellence that prepares our students for a future full of possibilities.

The partnership between home and school continues to be an essential component to our success. Parents and families have helped to create this safe environment where working together to ensure our children's safety and growth are top priorities.

A caring community of staff, students, and parents consistently collaborate to enrich and extend available opportunities and resources.

A closer look inside the hallways and classrooms of the Elementary School reveals the following characteristics and components that contribute to our unique learning environment.

- A solid academic curriculum aligned with the New York State Learning Standards.
- A PreK-5 English Language Arts program based on reading, writing, informational text, literature, language and communication, research and study skills, and productive habits and attitudes, along with the distinction of continuous improvement on the ELA assessment.
- An environment where professionalism and teamwork are the norm, and teachers continually strive to expand their own knowledge and skills.
- A PreK-5 math program that is rooted in real-life problems and situations, and where students are engaged in investigation, data gathering and analysis, probability, geometry, patterns and algebra. Our students continue to demonstrate excellent understanding of concepts, problem-solving strategies and reasoning skills.
- After-school enrichment clusters provide opportunities for children to explore their interests and involve children in activities such as sewing, games, and crafts.
- The Motor Lab is an exciting addition to our school that allows students the opportunity for additional movement and sensory input. Use of the motor lab stations addresses all areas of development through foundational and developmentally appropriate movements and skills. This includes activities like spinning, jumping, writing, crawling, rolling, bouncing, catching, balancing, cutting, eye-hand/ eye-foot skills and even playing in a small ball pit. As students continue to develop and improve their balance, coordination, strength, ball skills, and sensory experiences they will be more prepared for the academic tasks of sitting at their desk, reading, writing, and problem solving for math.
- Our winter and spring concerts provide all students PreK-5th the opportunity to perform for their families and showcase their musical abilities during the school year. Band is offered to all students in 5th grade with a band concert held at the end of the year. Our 5th graders also participate in their first musical.
- We have implemented C.A.R.E.S. this year as our meaningful school-wide behavior expectations program. Students have learned about these traits and what they look like and sound like in all areas of our school environment. We host assemblies for each trait to celebrate and recognize our students and all of their achievements. Our classroom teachers and school counselor collaborate to incorporate instruction around these expectations throughout the school year.

Assertiveness - Believing in and being able to stand up for yourself.

 $\ensuremath{\textbf{R}}\xspace$ sponsibility - Making good choices and taking accountability for your actions.


Empathy - Being able to know how someone else feels: "Walk in their shoes."


As students begin their High School journey, they will experience:
